





## • Social Work Curriculum

• The College of Social Work requires two internships for traditional students and one internship for advanced standing M.S.W. students. • Students in the joint-degree program would complete their final M.S.W. internship in a law and social work placement, such as the College of Law’s Children’s Advocacy Clinic or the Attorney General’s Office. • Approved internship sites are coordinated through the Office of Field Education at the College of Social Work. There would need to be access to both an attorney and a M.S.W. supervisor at the internship site. • Students who choose the Children’s Advocacy Clinic for their internship may not take the course for law school credit.

The normal program sequence for a traditional Social Work student in the joint-degree program is:

3rd & 4th Years	75 hours of Law and Social Work

Total Social Work Courses	54 hours
Cross Credit Courses	6 hours
Total J.D./M.S.W. Courses	136 hours

## Program Sequence - Advanced Placement

The normal program sequence for an advanced placement Social Work student in the joint-degree program is:

1st Year	30 hours of Law
2nd Year	30 hours of Social Work
3rd & 4th Years	55 hours of Law and Social Work
Total Law Courses	82 hours
Total Social Work Courses	33 hours
Cross Credit Courses	8 hours
Total J.D./M.S.W. Courses	115 hours

## • Conferring of Degrees

• Students in joint-degree programs receive both degrees concurrently. Law students may not be certified as a graduate without having completed the degree requirements in both colleges.

## • Residency Requirement

• Unless otherwise approved by both advisors and the College of Law Associate Dean for Academic Affairs, students enrolled in joint-degree programs must earn a minimum of seven semesters of residence credit. Based on the College of Law formula for determining residency, one semester of residency credit is earned for every 12 credit hours of courses taken in law and the College of Social Work. • All requirements for both degrees must be completed within five calendar years.
