Europa World

- Europa World is the online version of two print sources: Europa World Year Book and the nine-volume set entitled Regional Surveys of the World. It includes detailed surveys of over 250 countries and territories, a comprehensive listing of over 1,650 international organizations, access to economic and demographic statistics, and essential names and addresses and other information covering such areas as the constitution, government, legislature, political organizations, diplomatic representation, religion, the media, finance, trade, industry, transport and tourism.
To access: Open browser to FSU Libraries homepage: <http://www.lib.fsu.edu>. At the E-RESOURCES BY SUBJECT grouping, select INTERNATIONAL STUDIES. Select Europa World from the list of databases shown.

Factsearch

- This specialized database of full-text statistical statements on current social, economic, political, health, and environmental issues and public policy topics is excerpted from more than 1,100 mainstream and alternative periodical sources.
To access: Open browser to FSU Libraries homepage <http://www.lib.fsu.edu/databases.html>. In the textbox under **FIND A DATABASE**, type in first three letters of this database (FAC). Select "Connect Now" under **Factsearch**. Begin your search either at the Basic or Advanced Search screens.

Statistical Universe

- LexisNexis' Statistical Universe is a searchable database that indexes statistical information produced by federal agencies, states, and intergovernmental organizations. Users have the option of obtaining quick statistics on a topic, searching summaries of statistical publications, or going to the Web sites of organizations, universities, or governmental agencies that collect or disseminate statistical information.
To access: Open browser to FSU Libraries homepage <http://www.lib.fsu.edu/databases.html>. Click MOST USED DATABASES, then LEXISNEXIS ACADEMIC. Select *Statistical* from the left-hand column.

Department of Homeland Security (DHS) now publishes the *Yearbook of Immigration Statistics* each year (formerly entitled *Statistical Yearbook of the Immigration and Naturalization Service*). This publication (online and in print) provides information, in the form of text, tables, and charts, about the various types of foreign nationals. Types of aliens include immigrants, nonimmigrants (temporary visitors), parolees, refugees, and asylees, as well as those naturalized or apprehended. This source is also available in print (call number JK1800.S7) for 1980-1991 and 1993-1998 and in microfiche (call number Mif482) for 1983, 1986-1996).

International Labour Migration (ILM) Statistics

The database provides statistics on persons whose status as workers is in accordance with the employing country's legislation (documented migrants). In the future, the ILM database will include information on undocumented workers. ILM is based on a set of 13 tables common to all countries. Data are grouped per year, starting from 1986. Data may be viewed by country, by table or by year.
